Dear All,

Life has its turning points – those moments that either changed history or at a personal level, the direction of our lives. The landings on the beaches at Normandy were the turning point in WW2. Perhaps meeting someone for the first time, knowing you loved them and eventually getting married was a turning point for many of us. Was it the job we got when we left school? Think for a moment – I can think of at least three or four significant people or events, but that would all take too long to recount.

We have been reading through the book of Acts – many of you following the daily readings on Facebook – and on Sunday coming we arrive at Acts chapter 10. This is a remarkable turning point for the whole world!! Yes, it is as remarkable as that!

Up until this point, the early Jewish converts did not refer to themselves as Christians - they were Jews who believed that Jesus was the Messiah. They thought that Jesus had come just for the Jews. In Acts 10 a Gentile [non-Jewish person; everyone who was not a Jew was referred to as a Gentile and often not very respectfully] called Cornelius had a vision and this senior Roman officer was tasked with getting Peter to come and explain the Gospel. The rest is history - Peter comes, Cornelius believes and begins to follow Jesus and peter realises that the original command to go into the whole world and share the Good News was imperative.

It was the turning point. It was the moment when Peter realised that Jesus was for everyone and not just the Jews.

Many people down through the years have come to the conclusion that Jesus was for them – it might have happened in Sunday School, Church, an Evangelistic Crusade, in the privacy of the own home. They had a moment when their lives changed course.

Our country is beginning to come out of lockdown, and sooner than we were told or imagined, we will be able to gather together to worship. But things have changed. A recent Yougov poll indicated that only 6% of people wanted things to go back to as they were. Have we reached a turning point? For the better? Will this be a turning point too for us as a Church?

I wonder if looking into the potential face of death for young, middle aged and older will have changed how people view life? Our view that science conquers all has been debunked and maybe there will be an awakening of a deeper spiritual need? Let's pray about that!

Will our society see that there are things more important than money, possessions and celebrity? Will we turn away from the shallow materialism and seek something deeper and more meaningful? Let's pray about that.

Is this a turning point too for us as a Church? We have been scornful of using technology and yet it has become a friend and a good tool throughout this period. Is God encouraging us to embrace it and use it for good? Let's pray about that too!
