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If you look at the very end of the book of Acts, you read these words:

"For the next two years Paul remained under house arrest. He welcomed all who visited him, proclaiming the Kingdom of God with all boldness and teaching about the Lord Jesus Christ. He did this unhindered."

Paul, by this time was in Rome. He was a prisoner because of accusations made against him by the Jewish authorities. He is awaiting trial in Rome.

He is under house arrest, which means he is not allowed to leave where he is staying and has the constant presence of a Roman soldier to ensure this happens.

Paul does not see this as a terrible state of affairs but grasps the opportunity given to him and sends out invitations for people to come and visit him in order that he might share faith with them. The very last line in the book of Acts tells us that despite his imprisonment, the Gospel is not hindered!

We too are living in times of restriction.

Does that mean that our ability to witness to Christ is also restricted? I do not think so! The Church is the product of the Holy Spirit and the Spirit of God is not determined by human restrictions.

The people of God, as I indicated last week, are defined by prayer. Although we cannot reach out physically, we can ask the Holy Spirit to do in people's hearts what we are incapable of doing.

The Holy Spirit, we are told in the book of Acts, was the person that grew the Church despite the adversity the young and early church faced. We live in a world where we have become accustomed to thinking that if we cannot do something, then it cannot be done!

I wonder sometimes, how conversant we are with the four Gospels? Was not Jesus constantly doing things that humanly speaking were impossible? Was not the birth and growth of the Church itself an impossible task when you think about it? It was not Paul or Peter that were responsible primarily for the growth and expansion of the Church – it was the Holy Spirit of God working through them – even, and especially, when they were imprisoned and restricted!

We think that the current restrictions are making it impossible for the Church to operate and grow. As a denominational entity that might be true. The denomination we belong to and we ourselves as a Church in St. Margaret's will emerge from this as something very different from what we were in the past – and thank God for that!

But let me get back to what I said earlier and in last week's letter. The Church is defined by Prayer. Prayer is our breath of life. It is our line of communication and inspiration as we reach out to the Father in the name of Jesus asking for the Promised Holy Spirit to do in and through us what humanly speaking may seem impossible.

Our current situation? I think that we can say, as Luke did at the end of the book of Acts, that we will continue, unhindered, to witness to the Gospel of our Lord Jesus Christ.
